

We also provide adults – parents, guardians, school staff – with effective tools and strategies to build strong, positive relationships with youth.

With a presence in hundreds of Bay Area schools, Project Cornerstone involves over 4,000 dedicated adults who help us reach youth and create lasting, positive change.

Together with our passionate volunteers, engaged families, schools, and communities, Project Cornerstone is transforming the lives of youth and building a future where every young person feels supported, valued, and equipped to reach their fullest potential.

Dr. Pope lectures nationally on parenting techniques and pedagogical strategies to increase student health, engagement with learning, and integrity.

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## **YMCA Project Cornerstone Programs and Services**

YMCA Project Cornerstone understands that the growth and development of youth is largely influenced by their families and communities, including schools. Our approach is to engage parents, caring adults, school staff, and the broader community with programs and services which foster the acquisition of social and emotional skills, attitudes, and behaviors in youth (Developmental Assets) and the establishment of healthy Developmental Relationships between youth and adults. Our programs and services include the following:

#### **SCHOOL PROGRAMS**

Asset Building Champions (ABC) A 3-year program focusing on empathy, inclusion, and becoming UPstanders. Students learn life skills like managing emotions, conflict resolution, and celebrating differences through specially selected children's books and YMCA Project Cornerstone lesson plans differentiated by grade level for elementary-age students.

Los Dichos A 3-year bilingual (English and Spanish) program centered on positive cultural identity, with activities that celebrate Latino heritage and teach important social skills using specially selected bilingual children's books and YMCA Project Cornerstone lesson plans. Los Dichos provides a unique opportunity for Spanish-speaking parents to engage in their children's education and development.

**Expect Respect** A leadership program for grades 4–8, focused on empowering students to create an inclusive school community by discussing bullying prevention, empathy, and leadership skills. A YMCA Project Cornerstone staff member leads an interactive 3–hour workshop with 20–30 selected students who represent the school population. Students develop an action plan to implement positive changes at their school with the support of a school advisor.

**Preschool** A bilingual program (English and Spanish) for 3-year-olds, using carefully selected children's books to teach social-emotional skills and foster a love for literature.

Middle School SEL A 3-year program for grades 6-8, offering modules on topics like stress management, conflict resolution, digital citizenship, and navigating friendships. The curriculum includes slide decks embedded with engaging student activities, a high-interest video clip, and opportunities for peer discussion. A prerecorded lesson is also available for flexibility in facilitation. Schools determine when the modules are taught (e.g., in homeroom, advisory classes, or during a course such as ELA or PE).

**TK/Kindergarten** A 2-year bilingual program (English and Spanish) offering books and activities that build cognitive, social, and emotional skills for 4- and 5-year-olds.

#### **ADDITIONAL PROGRAMS**

Student Leadership Council (SLC) A selected group of high school students volunteer as members of the SLC. Students meet regularly with YMCA Project Cornerstone staff and Board Committee members to provide youth voice and participate in projects to enhance and support YMCA Project Cornerstone's programs and services while gaining leadership skills.

Asset of the Month Toolkit This toolkit highlights 12 Developmental Assets, providing monthly editable posters and handouts. Each handout includes asset descriptions, discussion topics, and activities for engaging youth and is designed for use by schools, after-school programs, community organizations, and families.

Summer Fun During the summer, YMCA
Project Cornerstone offers lessons and videos
on its website for continued student and family
engagement. ABC and Los Dichos lessons
include books, daily activities, and familyoriented projects. Middle school lessons feature
video content, reflection questions, and a
challenge. Conversation starters, focused on
a Developmental Asset, provide adults with
questions and/or activities to do with youth.

# WORKSHOPS FOR PARENTS AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS

Parents and community members can participate in a variety of interactive single-session workshops and a 6-week workshop series called Take It Personally (TIP), which focus on tools to strengthen positive relationships with youth while inspiring adults to make a stronger commitment to all youth in their lives and community. Workshops are available in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese and can be scheduled in-person or virtually.

#### SCHOOL STAFF TRAINING

All school staff play a crucial role in building assets and relationships with students and one another. YMCA Project Cornerstone offers targeted training to help staff seize opportunities to learn and grow with their colleagues to create meaningful connections and safe, caring environments. The variety of training topics focuses on building positive connections with students, bullying prevention and intervention, and incorporating asset- and relationshipbuilding into instructional strategies.

# Adult Role Model Gretchen Yoder-Schrock

Gretchen Yoder–Schrock, an educator at Christopher High School in Gilroy, has consistently held the personal and professional goals of building community through creating relationships, designing memorable common experiences, and teaching her students interpersonal skills to connect with one another. As a Spanish teacher, Gretchen engaged students with music, games, dance, cooking, and interaction. Now serving as the CHS Activities Director, she collaborates with student leaders to organize initiatives that celebrate diversity, including Multicultural Week, a gender–inclusive Homecoming Court, and a Spanish–music dance this spring. She's also been instrumental in founding the Gilroy–Takko Student Exchange Program and participated in international teaching experiences, including a Fulbright Exchange in Mexico City and a USAID program in



Ecuador. She and her husband spoke Spanish to their children as they grew up. Gretchen seeks to enrich her students' lives by providing opportunities for community building and by demonstrating that connections with others is what makes life interesting and meaningful.

# Caring Preschool-Elementary School Climate Don Callejon Arts and Design School (Santa Clara Unified School District)

Don Callejon Arts and Design School, a TK-8th grade school in the Santa Clara Unified School District, embraces the motto "Cubs C.A.R.E." – Creativity, Accountability, Respect, and Empathy. Students showcase creativity through art and projects addressing real-world issues, like climate change



and community-building. Accountability thrives as students and staff hold each other to high standards, rooted in mutual respect. Empathy is fostered daily through activities like morning walks, where students check on one another and form supportive relationships.

This culture is reinforced through community-building initiatives, such as Project Cornerstone's parent-led discussions, Lunch with Loved Ones, and weekly Community Building meetings. These events, along with campus-wide celebrations like Sports Day and Cookie Decorating, strengthen bonds across grade levels and celebrate shared behavior goals. Dedicated staff and parents create a safe, caring, and growth-focused environment where all students thrive.

# Caring Middle School Climate August Boeger Middle School (Mount Pleasant Elementary School District)

Established in 1965, August Boeger Middle School is an AVID and Community School located at the base of the east foothills of San Jose, serving a diverse population of approximately 400 students. The school provides a wide range of academic and extracurricular opportunities, all designed to prepare students for high school, college, and future



careers. The school's Community School supports the whole child's needs by providing family and community engagement opportunities, collaborative leadership and practices, extended learning, and increased and strengthened social-emotional support. The school operates an active Wellness Center that promotes social-emotional well-being and also supports our unhoused and foster youth through our CARE team.

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


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
